Plea to help solve jockey death

INVESTIGATORS probing the death of a keen amateur jockey have appealed for a possible witness to come forward.

The Health and Safety Executive (HSE) wants to trace a walker who may be able to help their inquiry into the death of Christopher Watson at Newmarket in November.

Mr Watson, 61, was exercising a racehorse called Kadouchski for trainer John Berry when he is believed to have been thrown against a tree after losing one of his stirrups.

The HSE has appealed for

any witnesses to come forward – particularly a walker who spoke to Mr Watson's family when they visited the scene on Friday, November 26, nine days after the incident.

The incident happened out of the sight of other riders exercising horses on the town's Side Hill Gallop.

Mr Watson, a retired businessman, held a jockey's licence since 1995. He travelled once a week from his home in Sapcote, Leicestershire, to exercise horses for Mr Berry, and had been doing so since

last summer.

At the time, Mr Berry said: "The fact that he wanted to drive from Leicestershire early in the morning once a week shows he really enjoyed coming."

"He was riding what was probably his favourite horse here and he died in a place where he was very well liked."
